Keith Moon The Who

The Scoop-

Keith Moon was probably the most unorthodox big-name drummer ever. His style could best be described as "chaotic." But, his manic, thrashing, hyper-aggressive style melded perfectly with the furious rhythms of guitarist Pete Townsend and the rumbling, frenetic bass of John Entwistle. He was all over his drum kit, rarely sticking to a steady groove, and he seemed to throw away all the rules and discipline of drumming. After the last note is played, other drummers go backstage and towel off; Keith Moon destroyed his drum kit. In short, he was a true original and he lived his life the same way he played the drums: with wild abandon. Unfortunately, it all came to an end for him in September, 1978 at the age of 32.

John Bonham Led Zeppelin

The Scoop

John Bonham was, quite possibly, the greatest rock drummer of them all with his incredible power, feel, chops, and musicality. He has influenced countless drummers. His playing was monstrously heavy and deep and it had to be; Led Zeppelin was a powerhouse that brought a lot of different musical styles into play. Bonham died in September, 1980 at the age of 32, after which Led Zeppelin called it a day. He was irreplaceable in the band and the passing years have not diminished his legacy; he is still the king of rock drumming.




Chad Smith Red Hot Chili Peppers


Dino DanelliThe Rascals

The Scoop-

Dino Danelli has been called "one of the great unappreciated rock drummers in history." The Rascals owned the pop charts for a time in the sixties and Danelli was the drumming dynamo that made them go. Trained as a jazz player, he brought a very energetic, soulful style, as well as a cool, flashy showmanship to those great Rascals hits. I remember watching him on The Ed Sullivan Show and I knew right away that

this guy was something special. Plus, he looked sort of like Paul McCartney. Danelli is still active at the age of 71 and continues to do reunion shows with The Rascals.

Ginger BakerCream, Blind Faith, Ginger Baker's Air Force

The Scoop-

Ginger Baker was one of rock's real characters and was the first "rock superstar drummer." His style was primal, as he melded rock's rhythms with jazz and African influences into his own inimitable style. Cream was a trio of superstars and Baker, along with bassist Jack Bruce and guitarist Eric Clapton, was a vital cornerstone. He was a showy player, offering lengthy drum solos, syncopated rhythms and a large double-bass drum kit. He had a mercurial temperament, as well as an on-and-off heroin addiction that made one use caution in approaching him. He was the most influential rock drummer of the 1960s. He died on October 6, 2019 at the age of 80.
